However, these changes were not fully approved via our correct protocol and in correcting this we want to get your feedback on our proposals.

Savings needed

To balance our budgets and continue to support those who need us most, we are having to find savings in all services we can, including our grounds maintenance and street cleansing contracts. We have identified savings targets in each of these areas -- about £100,000 per year in grass cutting and an average of £200,000 per year in street cleansing -- and we want to know what you think of our proposals.

We need to be clear that we do need to find a way to make these savings targets, so we are asking for feedback on our proposals rather than asking you if we should make cuts in these areas. We will tell you how we propose to make the required savings and ask for your views.

Our goal is to make the necessary cuts with as little detrimental impact as possible and to do that we need your help. If you think we shouldn't make a savings somewhere, just remember that we will then have to find somewhere else to make the savings.

We will also ask if you have any other ideas about how we can make savings in these areas.

Litter bins

We have just over 1,100 litter bins across the borough. We have been working with our contractors to identify bins we could remove with as little negative impact as possible. To contribute to our savings target, we are proposing to remove about 150 (14 per cent) of these.

We have worked with our contractors to identify 170 bins for removal as they meet one of more of the following criteria:

- Rarely full: the bin is rarely full, so we think it could be removed with minimal impact
- Other bins nearby: there are other bins located nearby, so we think one or more could be removed without a negative impact
- Difficult to access to empty: the location of the litter bin is a safety concern for emptying, such as being on a junction, so removing these bins would allow our contractors to operate more safely and efficiently
- Nuisance bin: the bin is in an inappropriate location due to smell nuisance, for example being very close to a children's play park or residential property, or is frequently filled with household waste / used for fly tipping, so the bin cannot be used by the public for its intended use



5. We are proposing to empty all highway litter bins once a week, excluding town centres which will continue to be emptied more frequently. Currently 550 bins in the borough are emptied twice a week, and the rest are emptied once a week.

Bottle banks area cleaning

Town centre and retail areas sweeping

We are considering either a 30 or 40 per cent decrease in the total budget we spend on cleaning Wokingham and Woodley town centres. We would sweep lower footfall areas less frequently, prioritise higher footfall areas and continue to keep the town centre street cleaner.

We currently sweep the streets and pavements anywhere between three times a day and fortnightly, depending on the location. We also have a town centre street cleaner for these areas.

Grass cutting



Dear Clerks,

Thank you for your feedback on the above proposals either through the consultation or via the online sessions which were very productive. I attach the Word copy of the consultation document for reference.

A number of Clerks requested that the proposals be taken through their respective Council meetings for further consideration. This includes all options for keeping the litter bins, for instance through their own staffing resources (i.e., Site wardens) or direct financial support. The proposal is to reduce litter bins by 150 across the borough and reduce the emptying of Highways litter bins currently emptied twice a week to once a week. The cost of maintaining the full complement of bins and retaining the twice weekly collection (as is now) would be in the region of £80k. An option is for T&PC's to collectively contribute approximately £80k and the current service could continue.

A report will be taken through to the Executive on 26 October which will seek agreement for the changes to take place including the removal of litter bins. It is envisaged that any changes to the services are made in November 2023, however if T&PC's either support, through their existing resources, or fund the emptying of the 150 litter bins (£80k) this needs to be notified to Wokingham Borough by Friday 10 November at the latest. It would be advantageous to have a two-year agreement in place to provide stability and continuity on this issue.
