JAC Report January to March 2021

The January lockdown has seen a dramatic fall in the number of young people out on the streets although not completely quiet. Mostly there were just individuals in transit or a few of young people who were in the precinct, Woodford Park or at Tesco shops. There continued to be a group meeting at Southlake shop carpark throughout this time, the same group moved from there to meet at the pavilion in Woodford, some of this group are now on mopeds and are in transit mainly moving between Southlake shops, Woodford Park, Woodley Precinct and Earley. They are becoming more communicative but do not wish to engage in any other form of activity and just want to 'hang out' together. Conversations around litter and noise were the norm and around social distancing especially as the group increased in size as the months progressed. Prolonged conversations have not been possible, just keeping a maximum of 15 minutes contact with groups has been difficult but necessary for safety of staff.

A couple of larger groups gathered for birthday celebrations, one large group of about 20 in January at the Woodford Park Pavilion and a smaller group of 10 in March in Ashenbury Play park.

The cold and wet weather on occasions meant some nights there were no young people out at all or just a few in transit on bikes. Mostly conversations have been around home learning and future implications on exams and college, etc. Some had family members who suffered from COVID, one who was in intensive care but generally they were all quite positive and looking forward to being able to meet friends and family again.

Skate park was still busy during the afternoons especially on the slightly warmer and lighter days. Woodford Park still had families gathering and as the days get longer there is likely to be teenagers using the park for longer.

Families were kept in contact with through Food Parcel deliveries most weeks with extra Easter hampers delivered at end of March.

The Journey to Independence House continues to support the same young single mum and children who have been there now for over a year.

At our Rehoboth Centre face to face sessions for those with an EHCP or who are children of key workers continued through these months with all other sessions taking place online. Once schools opened again on 8 March all sessions returned to face to face at Rehoboth. Educations placements for all 5 of our Horse Care students took place with some onsite learning for those more advanced in their course and others mostly online until 8 March.

WOODFORD PARK LEISURE CENTRE, SPORTS DEVELOPMENT AND ACTIVITIES

REPORT OF THE LEISURE SERVICES MANAGER

PURPOSE OF REPORT

To inform and update Members on developments at Woodford Park Leisure Centre.

Return of Outdoor Activities

In line with the Government's published roadmap for the easing of lockdown restrictions we were able to open all of our outdoor facilities to hire for organised sport from Monday 29th March. This included the reopening of the 3G Pitch, hard surface area and our grass football and cricket pitches. Junior Park Run will also hopefully be returning from late April.

Optalis

Optalis have confirmed that they will be restarting their Woodley Day Service out of Woodford Park Leisure Centre from Tuesday 6th April.

Return of The Gym and Indoor Under 18 Activities

Assuming no late notice roadmap changes, The Gym on the Park will be reopening on Monday 12th April. Unfortunately, indoor exercise classes are not permitted to return until mid-May and so all members have again been offered the opportunity to remain suspended until their chosen activity is able to return. On the same date indoor under 18 activities are scheduled to return meaning we can welcome back hirers including Tumble Tots and Bulmershe Gymnastics Club as well as our own after school clubs and activities.

Patio Area / Outdoor Exercise Classes

Despite not being able to offer exercise classes indoors a plan is in place to offer small group exercise sessions outdoors on the patio area outside the front doors of the Leisure Centre. The pergola / wisteria has already been removed and low cost accessories have been ordered to help convert the area into a suitable place to exercise. A timetable showcasing the classes on offer has been published on the website and we are hopeful that this offering will have a positive impact on whether or not members choose to reactivate their memberships.

In the future, it is recommended that the Committee look at the patio area outside the front of the Leisure Centre as a possible area for development (either as a seating area or as a dedicated area to exercise during the spring and summer months).

Feel Good Membership Offer

From 1st April until 30th April we will be running a promotion offering gym memberships for $\pounds 20.00$ per month (instead of the standard $\pounds 24.99$ per month). We are hoping that the "Feel Good Membership" will encourage people to get out and get active again after a tough year spent mostly indoors. All exercise classes will be included free of charge as part of the membership and members will be able to access the gym at any time. We are also hopeful that the promotion will help us to regain some of those members lost throughout the past year.

Easter Activities

The second week of the Easter holidays will see the return of our own holiday activities for children. We will be offering a Multi-Sports Camp for children aged between 5 and 10 years old and a Gym Fit Camp for children aged between 11 and 15 years. Both camps are free of charge for children whose parents are active gym members.

Berkshire Renegades

April 2021 will finally see the commencement of our relationship with the Berkshire Renegades, who were initially due to start hiring our facilities in March last year. The Berkshire Renegades are an American football team who offer various sessions for both adults and children and will be hiring the 3G pitch (and possibly some other facilities) most Saturdays and Sundays throughout the spring and summer months.

Pulse Fitness Gym Equipment

Conversations are now underway with Pulse Fitness regarding the gym equipment lease that is due to expire in November 2021. We are hopeful for a reduction in price if we keep the same equipment (which is still in good condition) and updates will be presented to the Committee when available.

First Days Children's Charity

First Days are hopeful that they can launch their school uniform hub out of Woodford Park Leisure Centre on Wednesday 14th April. Initially, the plan is to run the service every Wednesday from 12:30pm – 2:30pm.

3G Pitch – Opening Hours Extension Proposal

During the last Committee meeting a presentation from Mark Rozzier (Chairman of Woodley United Football Club) highlighted the growth of youth football in Woodley and the high demand for training facilities across the town.

Following the presentation, we contacted our partner clubs to gauge interest in an extension to the opening hours of the 3G Pitch from 9pm to 10pm. Below are two responses:

Mark Rozzier, Woodley United

The extension of opening times of the 3G from September to March to 10.00 pm will enable Woodley United to:

- Move older youth / adult teams to a 9.00 pm start thus freeing up earlier time slots to accommodate the expanding younger age groups.
- Increase the training time available to the 1st and ladies' teams in keeping with the level of football they compete at.

Richard Rodway, Woodley Wanderers

Our men's teams would definitely benefit from a 9pm slot. Beyond that, it is question of whether any of your habitual 8pm bookings take the opportunity to move to a later slot, freeing up earlier slots.

Our U16s teams for next season (and perhaps my U15s also) would potentially be up for a vacated 8pm slot (if any) I think, enabling me to crowbar some more of our younger teams into our traditional earlier slots.

It is proposed that the Council apply for planning permission to Wokingham Borough Council in order to seek an extension of one hour to the existing permitted operating times of the 3G pitch from 9pm to 10pm on Mondays, Tuesdays, Wednesdays and Thursdays throughout the year.

RECOMMENDATIONS:

PARKS AND BUILDINGS

REPORT OF THE DEPUTY TOWN CLERK

Purpose of Report

To inform Members of matters concerning the Town Council's buildings and maintenance of the facilities.

Woodford Park Leisure Centre

Pergola

The pergola outside the entrance has been removed as it was becoming unsafe. The space will now be used as an outdoor exercise space which will be utilised particularly during the period from the start of the relaxing of lockdown restrictions until indoor exercise classes can resume in the normal way. Options will be considered for improving the use and aesthetics of this space going forwards. The planted beds will also be revamped with new planting.

Garden of Remembrance

Antisocial behaviour has continued to be problem in the garden with young people gathering, playing music, smoking cannabis and deterring other visitors from visiting the garden. Residents have been encouraged to report instances to the police as well as the Council. Officers have also been in contact with the local police team to address this.

Friends of Woodford Park

The Friends volunteers continue to maintain the beds in the park along with other tasks around the park and in the Garden of Remembrance.

Allotments

The site has been very busy during the lockdown period. The new rules restrict bonfires to the winter months and this was well adhered to last year. This will be monitored again this year. The waiting list for a plot is currently very high – at around 80 prospective tenants.

Maintenance Depot

The new electricity supply to the Maintenance yard will be installed on 15/16 April. The trenching work will be carried out in house and in advance of that date. The cable will be installed and connected by Southern Electric.

Woodford Park Play Area

Tenders

7 Tenders were received and these have been shortlisted to 3, following a scoring exercise and also taking into account consultation comments from the Addington School team who took part in a session to assess the accessibility and inclusive play value which was a key requirement in the design brief. This consultation exercise also identified some key items that could be added to the successful scheme if not already present e.g. double width ground level trampoline to enable wheelchair access and adapted swing seats.

Some visuals of the three shortlisted designs are attached at **APPENDIX A**

Consultation

Public consultation on the three shortlisted designs will be carried out using the Council's website and social media channels. This will include a survey to enable residents to indicate favourite items of equipment, preferred overall scheme design and any other comments they may have. All Members will be sent information on the consultation once the pages go live. Any members can also request to view the tender responses which are

too large to include in this agenda. We will also consult specifically with the Friends of Woodford Park volunteers and Rotary – in respect of the Rotary Garden.

The design proposals received include the use of an area of the Memorial Ground – around and to the rear of the skate park. This area is currently grass and the Council, acting as the Trustee of the Memorial Ground, will need to consider the use of this area. The approximate proposed footprint is attached at **APPENDIX B**.

The consultation responses will be brought back to the Committee with a recommendation for the appointment of the contractor.

Environmental/wildlife

Information on wildlife and environmental initiatives is attached at **APPENDIX C.** This information is updated as initiatives progress or are added.

Community Halls

It was requested at the last meeting that an update be provided on how hirers are currently operating and if/when they may be looking to return to in person activities in the halls. Officers have kept in contact with hirers and most are keen to return once restrictions are lifted to allow this. Some of the children's groups are returning from 12 April, as are the Czech school at the Oakwood Centre. Indoor fitness and dance remain subject to restrictions until a further date and we are keeping in contact with these regular hirers to facilitate a return as soon as possible.

We are receiving a steady stream of enquiries for party and celebration bookings at the halls and the Oakwood Centre. These will be facilitated as soon as restrictions allow.







Wildlife in Woodley

Project	Progress/current situation
Allotments	
Bee hives	 Bee keepers agreement / application process in place. 11 active hives on site. Tenants Committee managing day to day.
Wild flowers	Wildflowers have been sewn in an area of the site – near to the bee hive enclosure. Wild flowers will encourage pollinators – bees/beetles/butterflies/moths/flies.
Wildlife pond	The pond has been dug out by the Council's Grounds Team. The tenants committee has not yet installed a liner as the pond filled very quickly during wet whether. Additional drainage work in this area of the site is required which will also allow for flood drainage from the pond during very wet periods.
Flowers on plots	Many tenants plant flowers and flowering plants on their plots in addition to vegetable crops.
Natural margins	The natural margins around the perimeter of the site provide habitat for insects, birds, etc
Parks	
Lake Regeneration	This project included reshaping the banks of the lake and the introduction of native flowering pond, marginal planting and reeds to encourage insect populations and provide nesting habitat for birds. Shallower areas also provide habitat for amphibians.
Bird nesting boxes	The Friends of Woodford Park have installed some nesting boxes near the Garden of Remembrance. We are intending to install more around Woodford Park and other park areas – along with bat nesting boxes. The Grounds Team are intending to install nesting boxes – this work has been delayed due to the Covid-19 lockdown situation.
Friends Group flower beds	Flower and shrubs planted and maintained by the Friends group encourage pollinators and insects.
Natural margins	The natural margins around the perimeter of the site provide habitat for insects, birds, etc
Community Orchard / fruit trees	Fruit from the orchard provides food for a variety of insects and birds. Wildflowers will be planted adjacent to the orchard to encourage insects and pollinators.
Limited pesticide use	Pesticide use is limited to areas where persistent weeds are prevalent and for maintenance of the fine turf on the bowls green.
Bug habitat	Logs from felled/damaged trees are left on site to rot and provide habitat for beetles and bugs. A large bug hotel is planned for the island in the lake and will be constructed by the Grounds Team – this work has been delayed due to the Covid-19 lockdown situation.
Wildflowers	Wildflowers are an attractive addition to the park and also encourage pollinators and other insects. We are looking to add additional wild flower areas at all of the Council's open spaces.
Crocus	600+ from WI 100 from WI (FOWP) 4000 from Rotary (FOWP)
