Woodley to Reading Active Travel Route Summary of Design Changes

Woodlands Avenue East (Woodley town centre to Howth Drive)

This section would no longer become one-way to accommodate the proposed cycle track, which many of you opposed. A 2.3m cycle track is proposed along the northern side of Woodlands Avenue, taking space from existing verges and the carriageway. The carriageway would be 5m wide and still able to take two-way traffic.

To aid this, it would be subject to a new 7.5-tonne weight limit to prevent use by large vehicles and double yellow lines added. The speed limit would be reduced to 20mph.

The verges and existing footway on the south side would be largely kept, except for a narrow section of verge between Woodwaye and Howth Drive

- Proposals for "continuous footways" or "Copenhagen-style" crossings at side road junctions of Woodlands Avenue East, which encourage drivers to give way to pedestrians have been kept.
- The mini-roundabout on Howth Drive would become a T-junction with cycle track crossing while the lay-by parking opposite, would move to Port Close, subject to Reading Borough Council agreeing. The removed section of lay-by would be set aside to improve drainage and provide more space for buses to turn.
- Subject to Reading Borough Council agreeing, we aim to plant on green space next to Howth Drive to make up for the loss of trees.










Woodley to Reading Active Travel Route Summary of Design Changes

Woodlands Avenue West (Howth Drive to Church Road)

- The cycle track width has been reduced from 2.8 to 2.5m so less streetlights have to be moved and the cycle track is better aligned with the rest of the route. Drainage would be improved on nearby green spaces.
- The cycle track has been realigned near Addington School to avoid trees and slow cyclists down as they approach.
- The school entrance would be improved with a shallow raised crossing to prioritise pedestrians and cyclists while leaving enough space for queues. A guardrail is proposed on the footway approaching the entrance.
- Zebra crossings along Woodlands Avenue West will now be provided on shallow raised tables.
- Parts of the cycle track have been moved to create a green space for drainage and separating it from the road.










Woodley to Reading Active Travel Route Summary of Design Changes

Church Road, Palmerstone Road and Culver Lane


- The proposed cycle track now stops at the Palmerstone Road junction and a continuous footway crossing at this location has been adjusted to tie into the existing layout.
- The speed limit on Palmerstone Road and Culver Lane would be reduced to 20mph while the junction of Culver Lane and Eastcourt Avenue would be improved to give cyclists and pedestrians priority.
- Double yellow lines would be painted to restrict parking along Culver Lane.

























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


SECTION 1 - WOODLANDS AVENUE - LOOKING EAST




SECTION 2 - WOODLANDS AVENUE - LOOKING EAST





The scheme proposal has been identified during the development of the Wokingham Borough Local Cycling and Walking Infrastructure Plan with the main aim to improve the cycling and walking connectivity between Woodley and Reading, which is of substandard provision. Providing new cycling and walking facilities that are safe, attractive, and inclusive for all could unlock the huge potential of a modal shift towards more active transport modes whilst reducing car dependency for journeys on this corridor. The design proposal will embrace inclusivity considering the users' needs of all ages and abilities.

We aim to get more people to walk and cycle realising the benefits that this will have on our residents' health and wellbeing, improving air quality, addressing inequalities, tackling congestion on our roads, and helping us respond to the <u>climate emergency</u>.

The project is in line with the vision of the Corporate Delivery Plan to keep the Borough moving (enable safe and sustainable travel around the Borough) and enjoy a Clean and Green Borough now and for future generations to come.

Public engagement on the preliminary designs was undertaken between 24th January and 21st February 2022. Further public consultation on the revised scheme proposals is running between 11th July and 19th August 2022. Key stakeholders including local members and town councils of the scheme area have participated in a workshop to assist shaping the scheme and reach a consensus.

35. Prior to the meeting commencing, Sergeant Simon Botham and PCSO Clare Towse (Thames Valley Police North Wokingham Policing Team) spoke to Members regarding the issue of escooting and cycling within the Woodley Town precinct.

Sergeant Botham stated that Thames Valley Police (TVP) see e-scooters and e-bikes as an increasing issue, causing not only a general nuisance but also anti-social behaviour (ASB) and significant danger to pedestrians and road users.

TVP recognise that e-scooters are popular with children and young adults as they are seen as a good, low-cost form of transport. They are also easy to purchase. However, as the law currently stands, they are only permitted to be used on private land and are not road legal.

Previously TVP have tackled the issue through engagements and education, proactively stopping users and advising them of the law. However this can only go so far, and a lot of the younger users are often not interested and continue to ride their e-scooters. It was noted that there are still on-going trials around the country into the potential legalisation of e-scooters.

TVP's last phase, prior to moving to enforcement, is to try and engage with schools to educate pupils on the use of e-scooters. However, it was noted that a Section 59 warning notice was issued under ASB legislation to one individual who had been riding an e-scooter in a dangerous manner.

Sergeant Botham noted that the issue of e-bikes was different to that of e-scooters as these were legal to ride on the road, so there is appropriate legislation which gives police more powers to enforce their appropriate use.

Following a query, Sergeant Botham confirmed that the police do not have the power to formally request identification when they stop an e-scooter user as the offence is not committed under Section 1. However, if there are repeated stops, then the team do start to recognise individuals.

It was noted that, should a by-law be introduced to make the town precinct a non-cycle area, then this would give TVP more power to enforce the use of e-bikes in the area; this would be via a fixed penalty notice. However, this would not cover the use of e-scooters.

Sergeant Botham confirmed that e-scooters are seen as a non-entity as they are not currently covered in any legislation as either a pedal cycle nor another form of vehicle. This makes their illegal use difficult to enforce. It was noted that the introduction of legislation would make this matter clearer.

Further enforcement is planned in the town precinct, and Members suggested it would be beneficial for TVP to engage with the Town Council to conduct these. Sergeant Botham suggested a member of the Town Council could attend any purge, and that a joint press release could then be issued following the event to advise of the outcome and held publicise the issue more widely.

The Chairman thanked both Sergeant Botham and PCSO Towse for attending the meeting.

1. APPOINTMENT OF CHAIRMAN

Councillor Bragg proposed, seconded by Councillor Chadwick, and it was

RESOLVED:

◆ To appoint Councillor Horskins as Chairman of the Cycling in Woodley Sub Committee for the remainder of the 2022/23 municipal year.

2. APOLOGIES

Apologies were received from Councillor Gilder.

3. <u>DECLARATIONS OF INTEREST</u>

There were no declarations of interest made by Members.

4. WOODLEY TO TWYFORD STATION CYCLE ROUTE

Robert Curtis was invited to present information on the current situation regarding the proposal for a new cycle and pedestrian route from Woodley to Twyford Station. Members discussed the proposal and noted that the route along the northern side of the railway was the only practical route in terns of land ownership.

Robert Curtis stated that the land ownership was a mostly a mix of Wokingham Borough Council and Network Rail and that this should not present a significant issue going forwards. Robert advised that Wokingham Borough Council was looking at different sources of funding including the Government's Levelling Up fund, as well as a fourth round of the Active Travel Fund. Robert explained that the funding bid looked at three areas – Strategic Benefit, Economic Case and Deliverability. It was felt that the strategic case was good and that the project could potentially be delivered by the 2025 deadline, however the economic case was more challenging to demonstrate.

Robert advised that the potential cost of the project could be in the region of £3m and that the funding bid deadline was 6 July.

Members discussed the need to consider the wider routes into Woodley and linking up with other schemes providing safe cycle routes across the area e.g. the Active Travel Route proposals for a route into Reading. It was also noted that the provision of a cycle route may lessen the requirement for additional car parking at Twyford Station.

It was noted that Waingels Road was not considered safe for cycling due to the speed of motor vehicles. It was noted that there was a potentially suitable and safe route along Beggars Hill Road from the north of the Airfield estate.

Safety of the proposed route, particular in the winter was discussed and Robert Curtis confirmed that there were still a number of discussions to be had regarding lighting and surfacing that would be included, particularly with regard to the nature reserve.

Robert Curtis advised that in calculating the cost to benefit ratio for the project, a 5 mile cycling radius was used, which included consideration of potential benefits to Woodley residents.

Robert advised that WBC had received letters of support from Theresa May MP and from National Rail. It was suggested that a letter of support from Matt Rodda MP would also benefit the funding bid. It was agreed that the Town Council should provide a letter of support for the proposal and that the Deputy Town Clerk draft a letter and provide this to the Chairman of the Cycling in Woodley Sub Committee and the Chairman of the Planning and Community Committee before sending.

Robert advised that there was a need to maintain momentum on the proposal in order to try and secure potential funding from other sources e.g. developers funds. It was noted that the money in respect of the Bailey bridge at Sandford Park could not be used toward this project as it must be spent on the site.

5. <u>CYCLING STRATEGY</u>

It was noted that signage to safer cycling routes was lacking and that this signage should contain information on how far / how much time it would take to get to certain destinations or other routes. The lack of suitable bike racks was also noted, although 4 new ones had been installed at Loddon Vale shopping centre.

Cycling in the town centre was discussed as an on-going issue. Robert Curtis agreed to report back to the WBC Asset Management Team regarding the poor condition of the painted signage in the town centre. It was noted that a representative from Thames Valley Police had been invited to attend the next meeting of the Planning and Community Committee to discuss this issue.

It was noted that Councillor Jewell had previously provided a draft strategy for consideration and that this should for the basis of the strategy development going forwards. It was suggested that the next meeting should focus on that with a view to obtaining some costings against specific priorities.

- public consultation found 75% in favour of the proposed PSPO and 84% in favour with modifications. The modifications suggested do not really affect the PSPO itself – they made suggestions of such things as more speed cameras and more enforcement against dangerous driving
- the 16% not in favour cite a variety of reasons, but generally fall into such categories as sufficient powers already exist, sledgehammer to crack a nut, harmless fun, innocent people shouldn't be fined, events should be better organised and policed, too much regulation
- Council officers will be authorised to enforce the PSPO as well as police and PCSOs (although our resource is quite small, ie 10 ASB officers)

The proposal will therefore be determined at the Council's Executive meeting on 29th September. If you have any further comments you would like to make about the proposal, please let me know, if possible by 15th September due to the timescale to finalise the report to be published with the meeting agenda.

The proposed conditions in the PSPO (breach leading to a fixed penalty notice up to £100 or a fine of up to £1,000 on conviction) are:

In the restricted areas a person commits an offence if without reasonable excuse he or she continues to carry out activities from which they are prohibited namely:

- 1. being the driver of or being carried in (or on) a motor vehicle in circumstances where the following activities ("the prohibited activities") take place
 - a. causing danger or risk of injury to road users (including pedestrians)
 - b. causing damage or risk of damage to property
 - c. aggressive acceleration or braking or racing
 - d. carrying out manoeuvres such as (but not limited to) skidding, handbrake turns, drifting
 - e. creating noise through excessive engine revving, sounding horns or playing music
 - f. using foul or abusive language
 - g. using threatening or intimidating behaviour
 - h. causing obstruction (whether moving or stationary).
- 1. promoting, organising or publicising (including but not limited to via email, the internet, social media, or via any publication or broadcast medium) any event where the prohibited activities take place
- 1. attending an event as defined in clause 2 above either as a vehicle owner or spectator where the prohibited activities take place

Schedule of the restricted areas

All land owned, maintained or managed by the Council and any other place to which the public has access as of right or by virtue of express or implied permission.

Car Cruising Public Spaces Protection Order

We are asking residents how they have been affected and what we can do to help following a rise in the number of unauthorised car meets.

We are considering adopting a Car Cruising Public Spaces Protection Order, which would give us greater powers to tackle dangerous and anti-social behaviour, ensuring the borough is a safe place to live. Car cruising is the term for when drivers meet to race or show off their vehicles.

This would restrict the activities associated with unauthorised meets, including dangerous driving, racing, aggressive acceleration and braking, sounding horns, playing loud music, foul language and threatening behaviour.

From January 2021 to January 2022, 82 incidents were reported to the council or Thames Valley Police. The most common locations for these car meets were at the Carnival Hub car park in Wokingham town, the Mereoak Park and Ride near Three Mile Cross and supermarket car parks across the borough.


If the PSPO is created, anyone who does not comply could be fined up to £1,000, or receive a fixed penalty notice of up to £100. It can be enforced by a police officer, police community support officer, or an accredited council officer.


It would go against the order to be the driver of a motor vehicle where the following activities take place:


- Causing danger or risk of injury to road users, including pedestrians

- Aggressive acceleration/braking or racing
- Carrying out including but not limited to skidding, handbrake turns and drifting
- Creating noise through excessive engine revving, sounding horns or playing music
- Using foul or and/or abusive language
- Using threatening or intimidating behaviour
- Causing obstruction, whether stationary or moving

It would be an offence to promote, organise or publicise any event where the prohibited activities take place and to attend an event where the prohibited activities take place.
